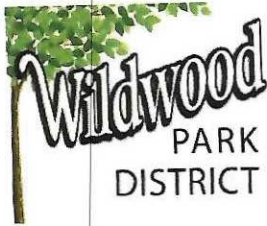

VALLEY LAKE REPORT:

The fall fish stocking estimate was signed with Keystone Hatcheries for the delivery estimated in November. The GLCC will be helping with a new winter WPD event in January. Details to follow.

Commissioner Corrigan asked how confident WPD is in the assessment of the possible sonar treatment for the aquatic weeds and associated potential costs for next year through the verbal estimate provided by the representative from SePro. Discussion. Commissioner Brueck stated this type of treatment was done in 2002 with mixed results, but the science has changed since and may be worth exploring. Commissioner Brueck will continue discussing with Rob Flood and ensure that representatives for this potential treatment present to the GLCC and the WPD Board to determine the effectiveness of this type of treatment.

Their next meeting will take place in January 2025 TBD.

IX. Valley Lake Report

Park District Manager Magnini included the final TIGRIS treatment report from 9/10 (preventative swimmers itch treatment) in the Board Packet along with Maj Kowalski's September VLMP reports. Discussion. The lake did not do well in the last month of the season after the beach was scheduled to close after Labor Day. Discussion. Weather conditions did not help but may be worth exploring deeper into alternative treatment options before next year along with contractor presentations at upcoming Board Meetings. Commissioners Corrigan and Jante asked Park District Manager Magnini to reach out to SePro to discuss pricing and product specifications on phosphorous absorbing bags/socks for Valley Lake.

B. IAPD Annual Business Meeting Delegate Confirmation

President Jante entertained a motion to designate Commissioner Anna Nelson as the Wildwood Park District's delegate to the IAPD Annual Business Meeting taking place on Saturday, January 25th, 2025 at the 2025 IAPD/IPRA Soaring to New Heights Conference as presented. So moved, Commissioner Corrigan. Seconded, Commissioner Brueck. All in favor, motion carried.

C. Troop 671 Eagle Project Plaque

Park District Manager Magnini reported that Troop 671 approached the Park District to split the cost of a new Eagle Scout project nameplate plaque for current and future Eagle Scouts who complete an Eagle Project for the Park District. The existing plaques at Rule House are full with no additional nameplates available. The estimated cost with the WPD logo added is \$410.00 total with WPD paying \$205.00 at 50% of the cost. Discussion. The Board gave their verbal approval to have Magnini move forward with this purchase as it remains under his \$1,000.00 purchasing threshold before moving to the Board level.

D. Open Enrollment Plan Selection PDRMA Health Insurance for Park District Manager Magnini

Product Use Guide

EutroSORB. A novel solution to rapidly remove phosphorus and protect water quality.

Eutrophication—the natural aging processes of waterbodies that is accelerated by excessive nutrient loading, frequently due to runoff. The impacts are degraded water quality, poor aquatic ecosystem health, and impaired operations. Phosphorus is a key limiting nutrient in water resources—one pound of phosphorus can support five hundred pounds of algae growth.



EutroSORB phosphorus filtration technology is a novel solution for rapidly removing phosphorus from moving water. EutroSORB filters immediately bind and reduce phosphorus concentrations in surface waters.



An example of "In Series" arrangement

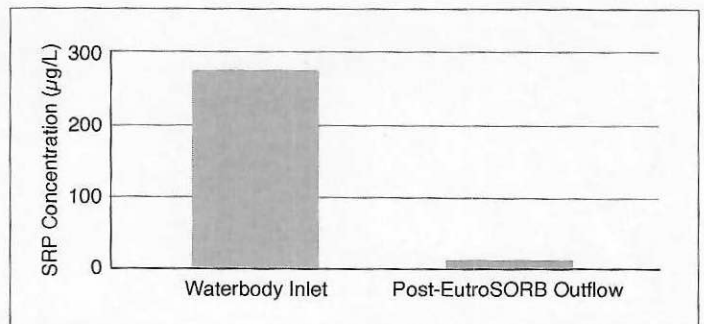
EutroSORB filters are composed of a highly specific phosphorus-binding media contained inside of a permeable mesh bag. The media has been formulated to specifically bind phosphorus in the presence of other competing ions in a wide variety of water chemistries. EutroSORB media has a high affinity for the phosphate ion, which is the most bio-available and often referred to as soluble reactive phosphorus (SRP). The bond between the media and the phosphorus compound is strong and stable under all relevant natural conditions. The result, phosphorus is indefinitely retained while

EutroSORB is deployed. EutroSORB can be easily implemented into a wide variety of aquatic systems.

Phosphorus Removal Efficiency

In fresh water, approximately 100 lbs. of EutroSORB is required to remove 1 lb. of phosphorus. Phosphorus removal efficiency is enhanced in waters with lower levels of turbidity, conductivity, hardness, alkalinity, and pH. Contact your SePRO Technical Specialist for assistance.

EutroSORB bags contain 2 filters. Each EutroSORB filter is 25 lbs. and capable of removing approximately ¼ lb. of phosphorus (SRP) from the water.



Removal efficiency will depend upon site specific conditions.

Where can EutroSORB be used?

- EutroSORB filters can be placed in or near inlets, streams, tributaries, and canals to reduce the amount of phosphorus flowing downstream.
- EutroSORB can be incorporated into stormwater treatment systems, drains, and retention basins.
- EutroSORB filters can be used as a physical barrier on dry land for periodic inflow or runoff of phosphorus.
- EutroSORB can be attached to buoys, docks, fountains or boats and suspended in the water column to remove excess phosphorus.
 - The media does not impact water quality or chemistry and poses no threat to swimmers or other recreational users.
- EutroSORB can be used to remove phosphorus in water and wastewater treatment processes, including concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs) and manure lagoons.
- EutroSORB can also be used in combination with other phosphorus mitigation technologies (e.g. Phoslock) to accelerate water quality restoration.

Optimizing Exposure

EutroSORB filters can be arranged in a wide variety of configurations based on the system attributes and

management objectives. Phosphorus removal efficiency is improved by enhancing contact with the flowing water, while lower contact reduces the phosphorus removal efficiency, but extends the life of the filter. The wide variety of configurations in both natural and engineered systems with flowing water allows the user to start small and add additional filters as needed. SePRO aquatic specialists are available to assist with the treatment process design.

Enhanced Phosphorus Removal

Improved phosphorus removal can be accomplished by arranging filters *front to back (in-series)* so that the outflow from the first filter is the inflow for the second filter.



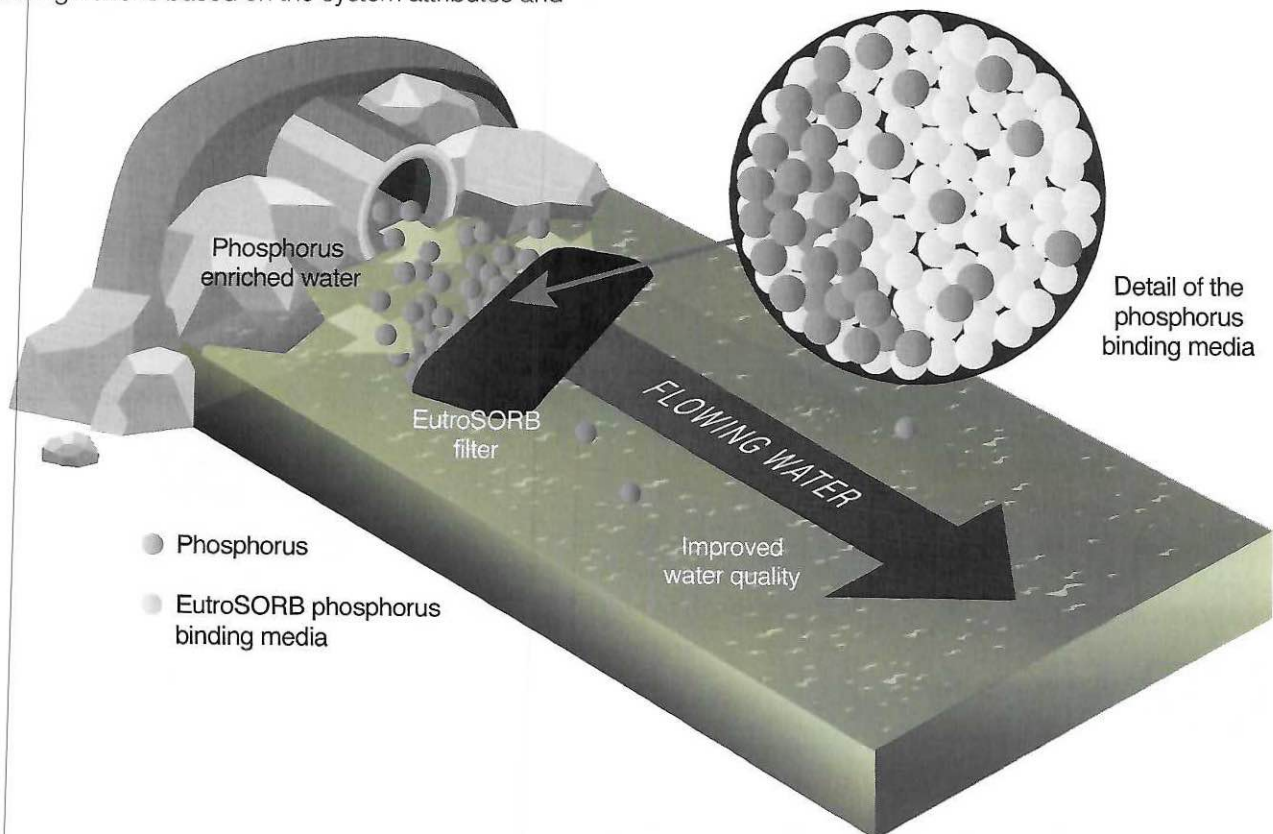
Larger Surface Area

EutroSORB filters can be placed *side-by-side (parallel)* to cover a larger surface area.



Deep Flowing Water Systems

Filters can also be placed *top of each other* to enhance phosphorus removal in deeper flowing waters.



EutroSORB Disposal

Once a EutroSORB filter is fully saturated and binding capacity has been exhausted, the filter media may be reused as a soil enhancer. The media can be dried and applied to the landscape surfaces such as turf, soil, or bedding. Phosphorus will not be released from the media during irrigation, as the media retains phosphorus in flowing water and prevents leaching. This results in an even distribution of phosphorus throughout the surficial soil and reduces phosphorus runoff into local waterbodies, further protecting water quality. EutroSORB filters can also be disposed to a landfill.

Ecological Assessment

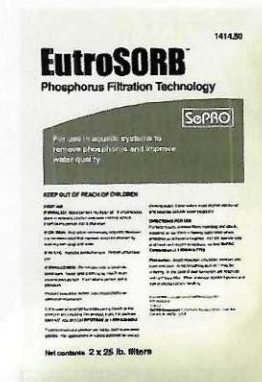
EutroSORB is insoluble and does not impact water quality or chemistry. It has an excellent safety profile with no environmental, health, or safety concerns associated with this technology. EutroSORB filters should be removed from a waterbody seasonally (i.e. after P capacity has been achieved).

Summary

EutroSORB phosphorus filtration technology is a novel solution that can easily be placed in moving water or suspended in the waterbody to reduce phosphorus concentrations in the water. EutroSORB is applicable in a variety of natural and engineered treatment systems, with a wide variety of configurations based on phosphorus removal objectives. After exhaustion, EutroSORB media can be reused as a soil amendment in sustainable suburban and agricultural operations. EutroSORB carries no environmental or human health risks when deployed according to its intended uses.

Accelerating Water Resource Restoration

Case Study: Lake of the Woods & Stephey Ditch

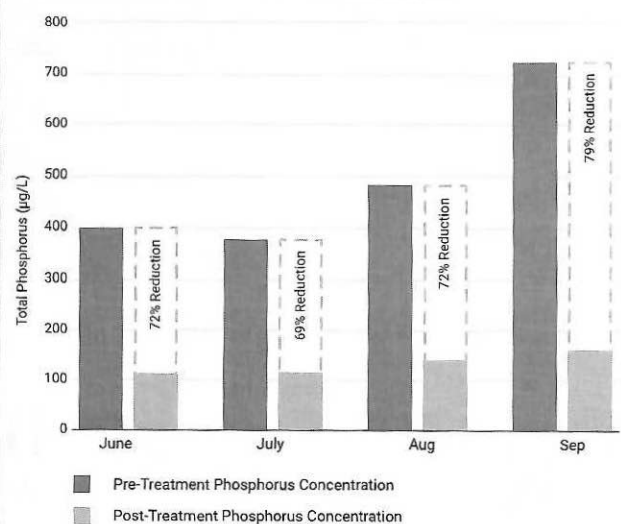


Lake of the Woods is a 416-acre glacial lake that is in northern Indiana near Bremen. The EPA first identified the lake as having excessive phosphorus pollution in the early 1970s. Lake of the Woods has a large watershed with approximately 70% cultivated agriculture. The lake experiences recurring harmful algal blooms that impair beneficial uses on the lake and threaten pets, wildlife, and human health.

In 2021, EutroPHIX began working to develop a lake management plan for Lake of the Woods focused on mitigating the internal load of phosphorus by inactivating the lake sediments and reducing the external load from the farm ditches that discharge into the lake. To help fund the restoration, the Lake of the Woods Property Owners Association (LOWPOA) began pursuing the formation of a Conservancy District to generate tax revenue to pay for water quality improvements and lake management activities.

In June of 2023, a demonstration began on Stephey Ditch utilizing a novel filtration technology to rapidly remove phosphorus from flowing water. This initial Pilot Program was funded by the Bremen Conservation Club. EutroSORB[®] F filters are composed of a highly specific phosphorus binding media contained inside a permeable mesh bag. The filters are easy to use and can last over a year in service depending on the flow of the system. The phosphorus is permanently bound and cannot be released, and the exhausted EutroSORB F media is non-toxic and can be reused as a soil amendment or disposed of in a landfill.

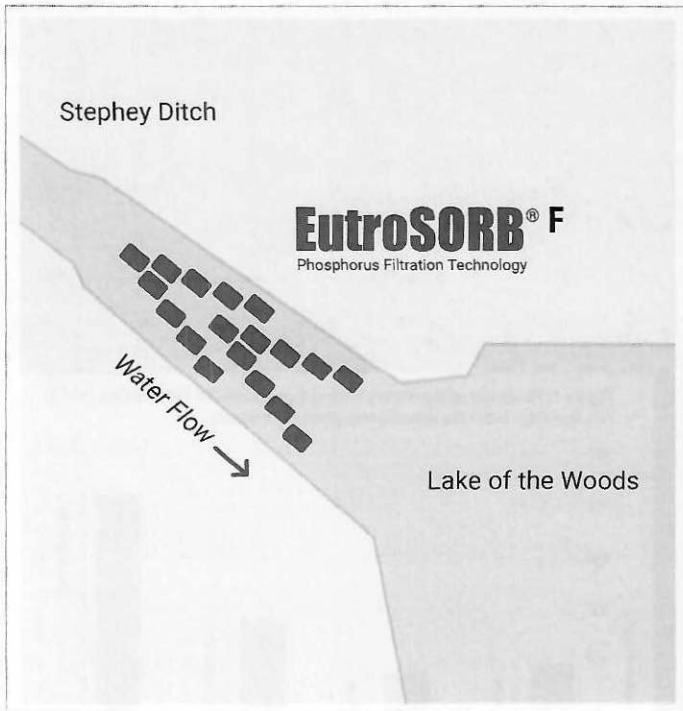


To evaluate performance during the demonstration, soluble reactive phosphorus water quality samples were taken upstream (pre-treatment) and downstream (post-treatment) of the filters (see Figure 1). **The demonstration has been very successful, with up to 82% removal of the soluble reactive phosphorus in Stephey Ditch and an average of 74% removal over the first four months.**

This project will be expanded in 2024 and the LOWPOA continues working on the formation of the Conservancy District with an anticipated completion of the process in 2025.

EutroSORB F filters strategically deployed in Stephey Ditch to intercept free reactive phosphorus and treat the water before it continues downstream.

Hi Brandon,

Thanks for reaching out!

EutroSORB F (filter socks) are the same product I referenced on the boat. I would place them like in the attached product brochure that Jen sent (reattached) so that during rain events water contacts as much filter medium as possible. They can be changed monthly or left for the entire season depending on budget and phosphorous inputs from the landscape. They could also be added to throughout the summer.

Pricing depends on where the product is purchased and installation fees but in general around 200-250 for a 50lb bag which contains 2 filter socks. Some brief numbers: 3 filter socks can absorb 1 lb or phosphorous. 1 lb of phosphorous can support up to 500 lbs of algae productivity.

Attached is a case study that also mentions using these filter socks for inflows for lakes from Indiana.

A good way to look at these socks is that it is a simple chemical reaction. If you have phosphorous inflows from stormwater drains or creeks – they are going to capture what flows through until the filtration medium is maxed out. I think of them as a very low cost solution to intercept P from the landscape.

1. Routine administrative tasks such as sorting through bills, payroll, depositing funds, PDRMA reporting requirements, meeting with Treasurer Corrigan for bi-weekly financials, and assisting Kathy with various administrative tasks, IMRF compliance requests, and associated reports.
2. Website management and board duties.
3. Assisting Maggie with finalizing Community Needs Assessment Report from 2024.
4. Beginning work on proposed FY 2025-2026 Capital Project List outline and priorities to discuss with the Board.
5. Virtually attended PDRMA Property/Casualty Membership Meeting as voting member to approve 2025 member rates/changes to policy/etc.
6. Secured Commissioner Nelson's hotel accommodations for IPRA Conference and submitted the IAPD Annual Business Meeting delegate confirmation for Commissioner Nelson.
7. Worked with Lisa Sheppard of the Glencoe Park District and Joan Scovic of the Northbrook Park District to assist Marketing and Events Coordinator Maggie Woznick with her scholarship application for WILS (Women in Leisure Services). Lisa Sheppard as a member of this organization reached out to Maggie suggesting she apply for this scholarship (to receive funds to offset the (No Frills) registration cost to attend IPRA Conference. 15. U of I Extension Master Gardener Program will present a house plant propagation course at Rule House on 12/3 pending adequate registration.
16. Cookies and Milk with Santa at Grandwood Park District scheduled for 12/13. 14 residents signed up thus far.
17. Holiday Gingerbread House Decorating event scheduled for 12/2 with 11 signed up already.

18. Attempting to offer new program "Holiday Gift Wrapping Event" for parents to have a place set aside so they can wrap their presents away from home complete with hot chocolate and holiday music.
19. Working with U of I Extension Master Gardener program to get educational sessions scheduled at Rule House in January for seed starting classes for the community. This is a U of I program and the WPD is assisting with the marketing and hosting of the event at Rule House. We hope these programs will help again generate interest in some sort of Garden Club.
20. Fall Yoga sessions are both full with 12 registrations each.
21. Winter/Spring program and event planning.
22. Winter/Spring Brochure planning. New programs coming include a Parents' Night Out movie night/pajama party for their kids, a blood drive mobile bus opportunity at Rule Park in January, and Story Time and STEM classes presented by the Warren Newport Library (at no charge to WPD or their families). New events include a Spring Tea Party with Belle from Beauty and the Best (Grayslake Pageant Queens), and the Gages Lake Ice Fishing Derby (combines elements from Snow Much Fun, Ice Jug Curling, Valley Lake Ice Fishing Derby) into one large event. Details to follow. Daddy Daughter Dance this year will be at the Warren Township Center which has more space, updated amenities, and more centrally located. Recurring programs and events will include Hit the Hills Sledding Event, Egg Hunt for kids/dogs, Tot Arts and Crafts Class, Basic Dog Obedience Class, Adult Yoga, Preschool, and more.
23. WSRA Trunk or Treat on 10/20 was a great success! It was nice to see many Wildwood families out and about.
24. Schoolhouse Adventures Preschool 3's program has 8 enrolled (2 more coming in December) and the Pre-K has 9 enrolled currently. Classes continue to go well without issues. The Pre-K class went to Kroll's Farm in October as part of the preschool program's first-ever offsite field trip.
25. Total Fire and Safety completed their yearly fire extinguisher inspections on 10/22. They quoted us (and we moved forward) with the purchase and their install of a new #20HF rated chemical fire extinguisher for the gas caddies in our Maintenance Shop to come into fire code/OSHA compliance. We already have an ABC rated extinguisher in the garage, which is not enough on its own to handle all the current flammables inside.
26. Sunset Temporary Piers scheduled were removed the week of 10/21 and stacked at Sunset Park on-site near the treeline.
27. Continued to meet with Troop 671 Boy Scout as he finalized the Cove Park kayak access project. I signed off his paperwork signifying the work has been completed.
28. Existing playground equipment removed from Old Plank Park thanks to Joe Aeberman, Tom Schon, Harold/Carroll Flood and others from the Lions Club! Removed equipment and swings have been transferred to Allen Farms and Idlewild communities for their eventual use. Previous wooden playground borders, tires, and concrete footers removed. All disturbed areas were backfilled in. We were able to re-use some of the pressure treated wood borders that were removed for a few drainage projects.
29. Old Plank playground equipment with NuToys install via Ostrander Landscaping still on schedule for December 2024. The paved walking path will be addressed in the spring.
30. Managing 2025 Consolidation Election procedures and petition packet filing period. Will conduct filing lottery if necessary and certify candidates to the County Clerk's Office per the appropriate time.
31. Looking into additional tools for phosphorous/sediment control for Valley Lake/Gages Lake heading into 2025.

1. Ongoing park garbage control and maintenance/Mutt Mitts replacements.
2. Ordered three new mutt mitt dispensers (one to replace damaged one at Twin Lakes and the other two will be added to Cove and Boulder parks where they were absent previously).
3. Routine maintenance and upkeep of equipment.
4. Clean Rule bathrooms, community rooms, and office spaces as needed - re-stock paper towels and soap. Mop floors as needed.
5. Replaced several damaged posts/cables at Rule Park, Pebble Beach Park, Willow Point Park, and Twin Lakes Park.
6. Completed rest of major shoreline brush cleanup along entire shoreline of Willow Point Park and in the cove.
7. With water levels lower, continuing to cut overgrown cattails around Twin Lakes ponds farther in.
8. Power washed buoys that were brought in and began minor re-painting of red buoy balls, so they are already set for next spring.
9. Finished painting the picnic table legs (black) at Pebble Beach Park. Will finish the painting legs only of the other picnic tables at Rule/Willow Point/Valley South. These picnic tables had already been refurbished in the last 1-2 years and just needed the completion of the legs done.
10. Refurbished the 12' picnic tables under the pavilions at Willow and Sunset. Staff sanded down the tables, replaced wood panels if needed, removed staples/tape/debris and repainted the tops tan and the legs black. Total of 6 of the 12' tables have been restored.
11. Refurbished last regular sitting bench at Sunset with tan boards and black legs. This is the sitting bench nearest the beach signage.
12. Refurbished sitting bench at Willow Point Park near the cove shoreline with tan paint and black legs. This bench also had the words "Gagewood Lions Club" engraved into the old wood, so those letters were re-painted black to stand out once more.
13. Picnic tables from Old Plank and Valley North Parks (1 table each) were taken to replace boards if needed, sand them down, and repaint the boards and legs like the other parks.
14. Painted all bike racks (Willow, Pebble, Sunset) with black high-heat paint.
15. Erected split-rail barrier surrounding large boulders in Rule Park lot to avoid vehicle collisions with boulders and damage to grass. This was a Safety Committee recommendation.
16. Completed the rest of the drainage project around the Rule Security Shed garage.
17. Continued leaf collection process on Grasshopper where needed along with blowing leaves off of playgrounds and walkways. Staff assisting Marc with organizing leaves so that he can use the collection system effectively.

Warrior Plants - River & Stream

The ecological significance of "Warrior Plants" in river and stream environments cannot be overstated, as they serve a critical function in stabilizing river and stream banks.

What are Warrior Plants? Warrior Plants are specifically selected species that are highly competitive in their niche community. These highly competitive traits help ward off invasive species. When used as part of Flywheel Ecology they are your secret weapon in building resilient, healthy ecosystems. It is important to note that many of these plants are not easy or impossible to establish from seed under these challenging conditions and many of the Warrior Plants reproduce vegetatively so they don't produce much seed and may be difficult to acquire by seed. Therefore, we strongly recommend their installation by plug to ensure their successful establishment.

Restoring river and stream corridors poses several challenges, including the continuous disturbance from flowing water, scour force, and the constant influx of invasive species from upstream. To address these difficulties, it is crucial to maximize the benefits of these resilient Warrior Plants. Without their installation, invasive species will become an ongoing issue, necessitating the extensive and never-ending use of herbicides. Thus, it is imperative to prioritize the use of these plants in stream and river restoration projects to maintain ecological balance and protect vital habitats.

We have established generalized planting zones that can be sorted in the plant list to help develop a planting plan for your river and stream stabilization project.

Cut Bank Side Of River/Stream Planting Zones:

- Cut Bank Toe of Slope (very tough zone area in high flow / scour streams)
- Cut Bank Low to Mid Slope
- Cut Bank High Slope

Deposition Side and straight Sections of River/Stream Planting Zones:

- Deposition Toe of Slope
- Deposition Low To Mid Slope
- Deposition High Slope

Woody Warrior Plants

Certain species of shrubs and trees can be used to stabilize banks, but too much shade can also cause erosion. We believe in stabilizing with rhizomatous herbaceous plants primarily in the midwest, not only because they have the highest fine root counts per square foot, but because they can adapt better to farm and urban flows, and they create an environment that can be managed with prescribed fire significantly easier than with woody species intermingled. We prefer to plant woody species after herbaceous plants are established and management demand has waned.

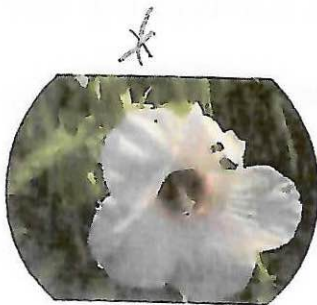

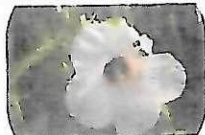

- Flowering purposefully timed throughout the season
- Complementary flower colors (see any art website to see these paired colors for ideas)
- Texture, think groupings of ferns, sedges, & grasses
- Foliage color: different ferns, sedges, & grasses have different shades of green, I am personally going to make a "green garden" that has only textural and various greens for interest
- Fall and winter interest such as form and color that is held throughout the winter, think Red Twig Dogwood and Little Bluestem grass.
- Perhaps a featured plant(s) such as White Wild Indigo, where you may only need a few
- Plant preference (shade vs. sunny, wet vs. normal or dry conditions, etc.) pick something that is not just tolerant of your site, but prefers that spot, you will be happier in the long run.

What Native Plants Should I Buy?

“Try’em all, you might miss a good one” :-)

If you are new to native landscaping and looking for a good launching point, take a look at our [native plant kits](#) as they have a pretty solid pallet of native landscaping plants to start with, from shady, sunny, to wetter areas as well. From there, the sky’s the limit.

Think of your yard as different “rooms” with each area with its own distinct feel, painted in a different color (flowers), function (seating or hall way), decorations (featured plants, fountains), window treatments or walls to block the neighbors when necessary (shrubs and trees, fencing). Make sure that scale is appropriate. Many people I believe go too small with plant clustering and plant an uninspiring mishmash of things (I often find myself doing the same when I do not have a plan, bad Nick!). Go big! Plant in larger groups of single species or limit a grouping to two or three complementary species to add dramatic effect.

Plant perennials!

Planting perennials will give the gift that keeps on giving. Perennials are plants that come back every year, year after year. Almost every plant we sell is a perennial, so feel confident that you are getting your moneys worth. Plus, native plants give you the added benefit of producing viable seed. This means you can collect the seed and put it into new places for it to germinate and flourish.

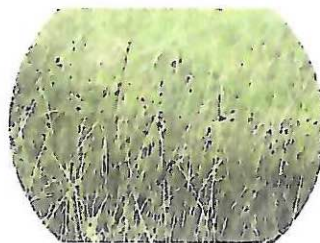

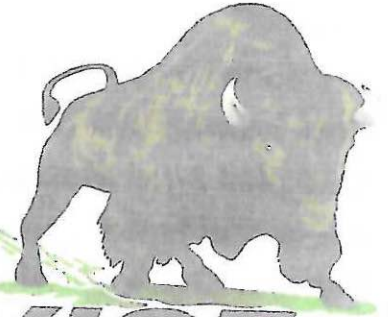

Hello All,

It's that time of year again when we determine how much we will be asking the county to levy against the assessed value of the district's property owners.

Items to note:

PTELL – Property Tax Extension Limitation Law

The Equalized Assessed Value (EAV) is currently estimated. EAV is used to determine the maximum extension of capped funds (PTELL). All the district's funds, except for Special Recreation, are subject to PTELL. Special Recreation Fund is increased by 4% each year per statute.

CPI – Consumer Price Index used in computing the 2024 extensions under PTELL is 3.4% . Statute indicates the lesser of 5% or the actual CPI is to be used for all PTELL funds.

PTAB Recapture - Property Tax Appeal Board Recapture.

Truth In Taxation – requires that a taxing district requesting to levy 5% or more publish the levy in a local newspaper 7-14 days prior to a public hearing.

Public Hearing – Required when requesting a levy more than 5% over what was received the prior tax year. Usually, a short meeting held prior to the board meeting.

Levy Filing with Lake County – Must be submitted to the county by the last Tuesday in December. For Tax Year 2024 Lake County has set the due date of December 31, 2024, per their email dated 8/28/24.

3. Historical Tax Levy information for WWPD showing what we have levied vs what we have received from Tax Year 2016 – Tax Year 2023. Additional information showing what the Estimated EAV used for the levy calculation was vs what the actual levy ended up being. Since the EAV is a key component of the levy calculation, the change makes a difference. For Tax Year 2023, the Actual EAV was \$2.3 million less than the estimate. In Tax Year 2022 it was \$4.1 million less than the estimate.
4. PTELL Limiting Rate Calculation – spreadsheet format provided by Lake County. Shows how the maximum levy extension for PTELL Funds is calculated.
5. Tax Year 2024 Tax Levy Calculation – spreadsheet I created showing you various levy percentages and the resulting estimated levy dollars the district could receive.
6. How each of the various possible TY2024 Levy rates would impact parcels owned by Commissioner for real world examples.
7. Graph of Revenue from all sources vs Expenses for FY2021-FY2024.

I'm recommending that the district levy the full value allowed of 3.4% on all funds subject to PTELL (rounded up percentage 3.767%). Currently, we only have estimated EAV to work with and as the Historical Tax Levy spreadsheet shows, we typically receive less than we ask for. As an example, for TY2022 we requested \$527,164.40 by asking for 5% overall levy and received 4.4% or \$2,017.40 less than asked.

We will be discussing the tax levy at the board meeting on Monday, November 18th. Final board approval must be made at the December 9th meeting. It is highly recommended that you review all the attached documents prior to the meeting. Hard copies will be available in your mailboxes next week.

SUBJECT: CPI Change for 2024 Extensions (for property taxes payable in 2025) for Taxing Districts Subject to PTELL

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) "cost of living" or inflation percentage to use in computing the 2024 extensions (taxes payable in 2025) under PTELL is 3.4%

Section 18-185 of the Property Tax Code defines CPI as "the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for all items published by the United States Department of Labor." This index is sometimes referred to as CPI-U. Section 18-185 defines "extension limitation" and "debt service extension base" as "...the lesser of 5% or the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index during the 12-month calendar year preceding the levy year..." (emphasis added).

For 2024 extensions (taxes payable in 2025), the CPI to be used for computing the extension limitation and debt service extension base is 3.4%. The CPI is measured from December 2022 to December 2023. The U.S. City Average CPI for December 2022 was 296.797 and 306.746 for December 2023. The CPI change is calculated by subtracting the 2022 CPI from the 2023 CPI. The amount is then divided by the 2022 CPI which results in 3.4% CPI. $(306.746 - 296.797) / 296.797 = 3.4\%$. The Statute indicates the lesser of 5% or the actual percentage increase, in this case 3.4% is the lesser amount.

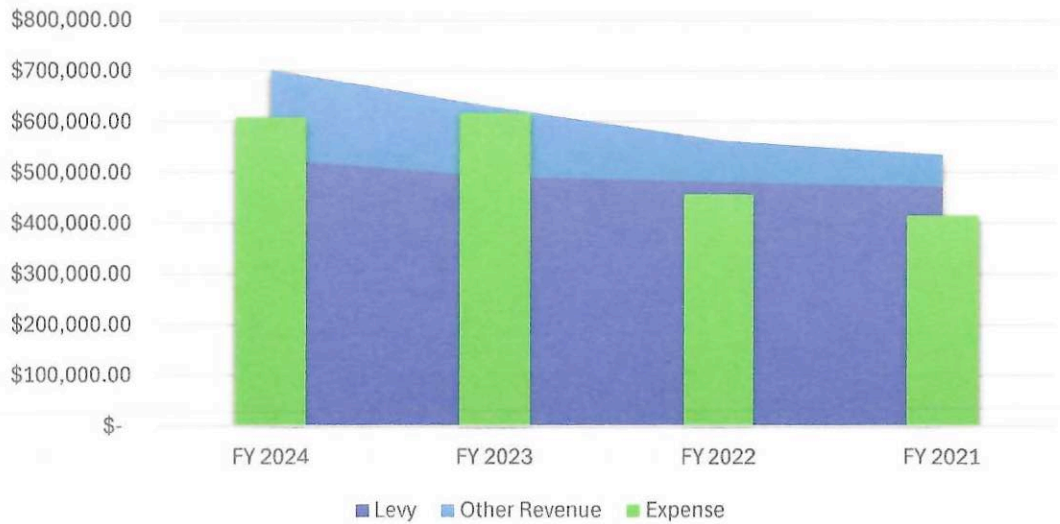

The revenue the district collects from the property tax levy is expended first, followed by revenue from other sources and finally, district reserves. From January 1, 2020 thru January 1, 2025 the IL minimum wage increased from \$9.25/hour to \$15/hour. Staffing hours for Swim, Camps and Security/Boat Ramp being equal, the increase in minimum wage cost the district approximately \$22,500 in base wages. During that same time period, the Tax Levy receipts have increased \$67,410. One third of the increase went to base wages alone.
